How to use ozgenonline.com

SEARCH ENGINES

What IS a Cousin??

A **cousin** in English kinship terminology is a relative with whom one shares a common ancestor, but in modern usage the term is rarely used when referring to a relative in one's own line of descent, nor where there is a more specific term to describe the relationship, eg brother, sister, aunt, uncle. The term *blood relative* can be used synonymously, and underlines the existence of a genetic link.

A system of *degrees* and *removes* is used to describe the relationship between the two cousins and the ancestor they have in common. The *degree* (first, second, third cousin, *etc.*) indicates the minimum number of generations between either cousin and the nearest common ancestor; the *remove* (once removed, twice removed, *etc.*) indicates the number of generations, if any, separating the two cousins from each other.

For example, a person with whom you share a grandparent is your first cousin; someone with whom you share a great-grandparent is a second cousin. Where your relationship to the nearest common ancestor is different from your cousin's relationship then the term removed is used to indicate this, for example the child of your first cousin is your *first cousin once removed* because there is a generation between you.

Non-genealogical usage often eliminates the degrees and removes, and refers to people with common ancestors merely as *cousins* or *distant cousins*.

The system can handle kinships going back any number of generations (subject to the genealogical information being available). In 2004, genealogists discovered that U.S. Presidential candidates George W. Bush and John Kerry shared a common ancestral couple in the 1500s. It was reported that the two men are sixteenth cousins, three times removed. However, the two are in fact ninth cousins, two times removed. Also, in 2007, it was revealed that U.S. vice president Dick Cheney and senator Barack Obama are eighth cousins.

If one goes back far enough, at some point all human beings will be found to be related. It has been estimated that the most recent common ancestor of Western Europeans may have lived as recently as the year 1000 CE, or approximately 30 generations ago.

Names reveal stolen tombstones in road

WHEN the names of the dead started appearing on a pedestrian walkway in the Cretan capital Herakleion, city officials were shocked to discover that stolen marble tombstones had been used in its construction.

"This small pedestrian walkway in the city ... was created about 20 years ago, but until now we did not know this material had been used," Herakleion deputy mayor Konstantinos Mamoulakis told state television.

Cretans realized the white slabs of marble were tombstones only when the tread of many feet wore away the dirt on the slabs and revealed the names of the dead, he said.

"We found out that some names had started to appear so this week we immediately started replacing the stones," he said.

It was not clear who had ordered the use of the tombstones - not the first time marble gravestones have been removed illegally from crowded Greek cemeteries and recycled.

Villagers 'banned from dying'

THE mayor of a French village has issued a decree banning residents from dying in his territory unless they own a spot in the overcrowded cemetery.

"It is forbidden for any person not having a plot in the cemetery ... to die on the territory of the village," the mayor of the southwestern village of Sarpourenx wrote in a decree that warned of "severe punishment" for offenders.

Mayor Gerard Lalanne said he had taken the radical measure to protest against a legal ruling preventing him from enlarging the burial ground in the village of 260 people.

"The first dead person to come along, I'll send him to the state's representative," he said.

Mr. Lalanne said he had been inspired by the mayor of another French village, Cugnaux, who had also outlawed death as a protest last year and who thus won the right to enlarge the village's cemetery.



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Burials at the Yatala Labour Prison

Yatala Gaol was completed in 1854 to accommodate the prisoners of South Australia sentenced to transportation.

Three proposals for gaols had been put forward – the first, a penal establishment on Kangaroo Island was rejected but the second and third involving hard labour out of sight behind stone walls were accepted.

The first effort at Cox's Creek was a failure when three of the five prisoners escaped. Yatala, known as "The Stokade", was built and became the prison for inmates convicted of more serious crimes.

Between the years of 1890 and 1914 thirteen prisoners were buried within the grounds:

The plan of the site shows the graves for Joyce and Bedford near the fence by what is now Grand Junction Road. The remaining graves are further down the hill on the right hand side (facing from the road).

Police report to the coroner re Patrick Buckley's death reads:

Sir, I have the honour to inform you that Mr Molloy, Superintendent of Yatala Labour Prison reports by telephone, that a prisoner Patrick Buckley, 56 years of age, who was convicted on 17th February 1913 at Supreme Court for shooting with intent, met with an accident in the prison quarry on the 13th instant at about 3.15pm – an explosion took place sooner than was anticipated – and that he (Buckley) died at about 1.15am this date (14-10-14)

Signed W.J.W. James, Sergeant.

Coroner's comment on reverse of page reads:

The deceased came to his death at the Yatala Labour Prison on the 14th day of Oct. from syncope due to injuries received by an explosion on the previous day.
