This Month's News from the Editor.

Hello, and welcome to this the first Newssheet for the year, we hope that you had a pleasant and happy New Year. This month is going to be an interesting month all round; the Committee is back at work, and with sleeves rolled up are ready to tackle several new projects.

Once again we are asking for help from our members, especially in the area of assisting in the cataloguing the Birth notices, Obituaries, and Marriages appearing in the early South Australian Newspapers dating from 1838-1951. These Newspapers appear on microfilm and are a part of the entire Newspaper collection held by ANDFHG.

Did you know? Official records of BDM's did not commence in South Australia until 1842, which was 6 years after Adelaide was founded; this means that these Newspaper records are the only available source in many cases, of locating early South Australian Pioneering Families. Therefore the cataloguing of these microfilms is a very important job, which is currently being carried out by Tammy Martin, Shirley Bulley and Mary O'Brien.

BUT! They need your help to assist them, so if you have a few spare hours a week, and would be

interested in helping out, please contact Margaret Flaiban at <u>Secretary@andfhg.org</u> with the words "Newspaper Volunteer" in the subject line, and either Tammy or Shirley will be in touch.

During the months of December and January, our membership continued to increase to a current 139 financial members, out of a registered membership of 152, which by any standard is a fantastic result. A BRIEF SUMMARY OF SPEAKER'S NIGHT JANUARY 2011.

Presented by Michael Smith.

"THE PHOTOGRAPHY OF ROBERT FRASER (1858 – 1934)"

Michael Smith presented about 50 of the 500 photographs taken by his great grandfather Robert Fraser between 1890 and 1910.

Robert Fraser was born in Port Adelaide in 1858, son of Scottish parents George Fraser and Ellen Andrew. Robert's father George was a light house keeper and worked on many lighthouses around the state including the Port Adelaide lighthouse, a photo of which was included in the presentation. George was originally from Cromarty in the North of Scotland.

In 1893 Robert Fraser lived at Ansell Street, Semaphore, later moving to 95 Hall Street in Semaphore. The house was named "Cromarty" after his father's birthplace in Scotland.

In 1885 he was co-proprietor, with his brother of A. C. Fraser & Co, a draper shop in Maud Street Glanville; by 1905 they had moved to larger premises at 220 St Vincent Street, Port Adelaide employing about 36 staff.

Robert became a wealthy man and was able to take up the hobby of photography. The photos were taken on large format glass plates. While he was not an extraordinary good photographer he did win 2nd prize in a photograph competition for one of his photos of ships at dawn in Port Adelaide.

He took his large camera and tripod to many places including Port Adelaide, the Adelaide City centre, Bridgewater and Second Valley.

Photos presented included the "HMS Protector" (South Australia's first warship), the

Semaphore and Largs Bay Jetties, bridges over the Torrens Lake and Adelaide street scenes. Robert also managed to captured events of the times including the Duke and Duchess of York's visit in 1901, Lord Kitchener's visit in 1910. He photographed one of the most memorable icons of Adelaide – John Martins in Rundle Street!

These beautiful photos were stored in a large wooden chest which after Robert's death ended up being placed in Michael's grandfather's chicken coop. When his grandfather died the chest was put on a trailer to be sent to the tip but Michael retrieved it just in time.

Michael has scanned the glass plate negatives electronically and is in the process of restoring them. This job is difficult as some had Vaseline smeared on the emulsion side of the plate to soften (defocus) areas when printing, the Vaseline has since deteriorated leaving smudges on the negative.

Errol Chinner from the Port Adelaide Historical Society who attended the presentation was especially interested in the photos and managed to identify some buildings no longer in existence.


