# Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th April 2013

A request to all descendants and associated families of Jeremiah and Mary Ware of Tasmania are invited to attend the 175th Anniversary Celebration of their sons, the Ware brothers Jeremiah George, Joseph and John's arrival at Williamstown, Victoria on 29 April 1838. During Australia's early pioneering years these three brothers, together with sisters Maria and Amelia, became well-known identities throughout the Western District of Victoria.

Jeremiah Ware married Mary Brookes in 1816 London, England.

They arrived on the 'Lusitania' in Hobart Town, Van Diemen's Land, on 25 April 1823.

Jeremiah George married Ann Young McRobie 1851, widowed 1859; she married William J Aitkin 1862 Joseph married Barbara Mary Bridget Jennings 1850

## "Women Smugglers"

Not only were women useful to the smugglers as signallers and carriers of messages from members of the gang to each other, but they actually brought goods in from the shore for them.

The voluminous skirt was a particularly useful fashion, for the women wound yards of silk and lace round their bodies and reached home as a rule quite peacefully with their contraband.

There have been cases, however, when women have, on inspection, been found to have had their petticoats puffed out by bladders filled with spirits.

A report from a Hampshire Chronicle of March 25th 1799 stated that

"A woman of the name of Maclane, residing at Gosport, accustomed to supply the crew of Queen Charlotte with slops went out in a wherry to Spithead, when a sudden squall coming on, the boat sank; the watermen were drowned, but the life of the woman was providentially saved, by being buoyed up with a quantity of bladders, which had been secreted round her for the purpose of smuggling liquor into the ship, until she was picked up by the boat of a transport lying near." A case of being buoyed up by good spirits no doubt!"

### FROM THE PAPERS

Perhaps the dreaded dray tax written about in this paper is the forerunner to our motor registration system?

#### THE ODIOUS DRAY TAX.

Nothing is easier than for a nominee or official member of our Legislative Council to say — "Put a tax of forty shillings a year on each dray; it will not be felt, and will bring in a considerable sum to be placed at the disposal of the Central Road Board." But it is not so easy to prove the lightness and equality of such a tax as it is to impose it; and after a patient examination of the subject, with no little enquiry, we are thoroughly convinced that the tax must be abandoned.

In protest an Anti Dray Tax League was formed. Meetings were advertised in the newspapers of the time. For example in the South Australian Friday the 21<sup>st</sup> June 1850 on page 3 the following advertisement was published

### ANTI DRAY TAX LEAGUE

A GENERAL MEETING of the settlers in the district of Mount Barker, and the vicinity thereof, will take place on Monday, the 24<sup>th</sup> day of June instant, at the "Golden Cross" Balhannah; when all the persons interested are requested to attend. Dinner at four o'clock.

# Genealogical Research Directories.

As you can see from the list of donated books from the Fleurieu Peninsula FHG there are a number of GRD's.

For those people who do not know about the GRDs, this is a yearly index of surnames which has been compiled by people all over the world. They paid a fee to have their surnames printed in the research directory, in the hope that someone of like mind will contact them, who is researching the same name. The name is printed in bold, followed by the area of interest and century together with a unique number. For example, **BOTT** (ERY) 1800's [123456].

So, if you are researching the name BOTT from the East Riding of Yorkshire in the 1800's, then you go to the back of the book and look in the index for the unique number e.g. [123456]. This will show the submitters name and address, sometimes a telephone number is given and sometimes an email address. You may have to resort to 'snail mail' if no email address or phone number is given if you want to contact that person. Even though these directories are a few years old and are no longer published, they are still a very useful tool and we hope you will take advantage of browsing through them. They are also available at our rooms on CD and we have the full collection, so you never know what you might find.

Ebay and other sites give a great insight into the desirability of some things, especially with the current trend of retro collecting.

Paul chatted about the identifying marks on items, a guide in establishing age and backkground to our family heirlooms; and kept us entertained with his anedotical stories and adventures during his career.
