HAMPSHIRE CLEAR A WOOD.

HOW CAPT. CAUSTON WAS KILLED.

From the Hampshire Chronicle of Aug 31 1918
(submitted by John Anderson)

His full name is Jervoise Purefoy Causton. Below will be found an extract from a letter received by Mrs E. Tuffin, of King's Somborne, from her husband Private Harry Tuffin, who wrote the letter, in which a vivid picture is given of the work of the Hampshire Regiment in clearing a wood. How it ever got past the censors we don't know. Allusion is also made to the death of Capt. J. P. Causton, who fell while leading his men. In the centre of the letter the writer says :--

Two of our Companies went over early in the morning, but somehow we didn't get connected up. We had to take a wood, and to do this we had to cross the canal. Well, our platoon (No. 9) had to go over and take the wood right up through the centre; it was the most awful thing to do in the morning daylight. Our Capt. Causton took us; we crossed the canal and a field, and came to a track which led through the wood, so our Captain placed us half each side the track so that we could keep close into the wood not to be easily seen, as we did not know the German position. Neither did they know we were coming. Then all at once we heard them talking; we were within 23 or 30 yards of them before they saw us or we them. They were chattering away like as if they were making plans, but directly they saw us they put their machine-gun on us and we opened fire on them. We stopped, and Capt. Causton ordered us to lay down to miss their bullets as they were coming at us like a hail storm. We hardly knew what to do for a bit. Then our Captain kneeled up, intending to lead us forward, saying, ' Well boys, we shall have to rush them, that's the only thing to be done.' Poor fellow had scarcely said the words when I saw him drop forward on his face and he hardly even murmured a word. Those were his last words. He was only about five yards from me, as he was on the right and I was second on the left, with only a track between us. None of us dared to move. They tried to drive us back but, although they had their machine-gun on us, they couldn't do it. They had killed our Captain, and we meant to drive them out. They were shot down in heaps in front of us, so they moved back, and we followed them. They tried to make another stand, but the same thing happened again and again, until we got to another track running across the wood, and they started to pepper us again with their bullets. We had no cover whatever. I got down into a bit of a hole, and lay flat as I could, and there were the bullets chipping off the wood about six inches above me. We stayed in the position until we cleared them right out of it and I thought 'Now we shall have it', and, sure enough, we were subjected to one of the heaviest bombardments we ever known. When we went into the wood there was scarcely a shell hole, but when we had finished, it was simply blown to pieces. We stuck it, but could see we should all get

knocked out, so, as we had gained our objective, we seven came back. We came all back through the wood with shells bursting on every side of us. It's simply marvellous how we escaped. All I was afraid of was that the bridge over the canal would be blown up, as it was only a light one our R. E.'s threw across. When we got back to the canal and found the bridge intact, we were across it like lightning. Wasn't I thankful when I reached the other side safely. We are left without an officer again now. I can't say any more about it now, you will see it all in the papers.

We miss Capt. Causton still as we were very fond of him.

Crowdsourcing to Record Welsh Place Names

A new Web site has launched a crowdsourcing effort to record all the place-names of Wales as they appeared on Ordnance Survey maps at the end of the Victorian period.

NOTE: Dictionary.com defines "crowdsource" as:

crowd·source [kroud·sawrs, -sohrs]

crowd·sourced, crowd·sourc·ing.

to utilize (labor, information, etc.) contributed by the general public to (a project), often via the Internet and without

compensation.

Cymru1900Wales.org is a collaborative project, developed jointly by the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales, The National Library of Wales, University of Wales and the People's Collection Wales. The goal is to use the Wales 1900 gazetteer to form the backbone of a national collection of the country's historic place-names, comprising everything from the earliest medieval records to the field-names still known to modern farming families.

In addition, there is here a huge potential to tap into local knowledge and memory. That is why, as well as simply recording the names as they appear on these historic maps, the organizers want you to tell them more: do you know stories about the origin of the name, true or apocryphal? do you want to record other versions of the place-name (especially ones we might not otherwise easily find), such as a form used by your grandparents? or do you remember the same place going by another name altogether? And then there is a chance to record your memories of the place – these will be kept in a related resource, the People's Collection Wales.

Visitors to the cymru1900wales.org website are being asked to study historic mapping of Wales, published by the Ordnance Survey between 1899 and 1908, and to record the location of all text shown on the maps: the names of towns, villages, woods, farms, rivers, springs, mansions – everything! There is even a competitive element to this mildly addictive process; the more place-names recorded by a volunteer, the higher his or her position in the Contributors' Chart.

Genealogy Research Assistant for Android Tablets

I haven't yet had an opportunity to try this program but the online description does sound good. Genealogy Research Assistant is a viewer and editor for family tree information to be stored on Android tablets. Due to screen size limitations, it is not useable on small-screen Android mobile phones.



According to the description in the Google Play store:

Genealogy Research Assistant gives you full access to your family tree research data when on the move - so you can have it all with you when out on a research trip, or at a family gathering, or just anywhere you want.

- Primary displays for a family group, individual person details and pedigree (direct ancestors). Navigate by sliding, or choosing a person from a list.
- Navigation undo/redo - makes it easy to move backwards and forwards between two people.
- Supports GEDCOM 5.5.1 for sharing family tree data with other researchers - both import and export.
- Data held on device, so doesn't need Internet access to see the trees.
- Supports multiple family trees, allowing switching between them.
- Supports multimedia. - photo, audio and video.
- See all notes, source citations and media associated with each type of record - family, individual, life events etc.
- Search facility for large trees.
- Built in help - doesn't require an internet connection to display.
- No subscriptions or desktop PC software needed
- .The producing company also promises to add Dropbox support soon.
