New 24.2.2 Update for Family Tree Maker



This is an important update for all FTM 2019 users, incorporating essential modifications in Family Tree Maker's FamilySync technology needed to accommodate changes on Ancestry's side and return to green sync weather. Developed together with Ancestry engineers, this update also improves the speed and reliability of syncing, uploading and downloading for FTM 2019 users who keep in sync with Ancestry trees. Once you've installed the update, the sync status will change from orange to green.

This update also resolves an issue with signing in to Ancestry on macOS 10.14-10.15. You can now reliably sign in successfully on these systems.

The 24.2.2 update also includes all of the many features and fixes that were released in the previous updates.

THE ENFIELD PIONEER CEMETERY



The Old Enfield Cemetery, situated opposite St Clements Church on Main North Road, is closely linked with the early history of Enfield. Although its exact date of establishment is unknown, it is the last resting place of many of Enfield's earliest settlers.

Early residents received a free plot in the cemetery when they purchased land from the large landholders in the district. It was never controlled by any church or council, and no official burial register was kept. It was a small, neat cemetery, that was cared for and maintained by Thomas Bowman and other residents of

the district.


Edmund Bowman took up land in the area in 1839, thus securing burial plots in the cemetery. In due course, at least six members of the Bowman family were interred in the Old Enfield Cemetery.

On 20 July, 1927, John and Mary Bowman, and Thomas Richard and his wife Victoria Jane Bowman were removed and reinterred in the North Road Cemetery. Although Edmund (died 1866) and baby Walter Ingleby (died 1860) Bowman are mentioned on monuments in the Bowman vault, the burial register indicates that they were not moved to North Road Cemetery. Another pioneer family in the area was the Brandis family, who took up land around Gepps Cross. George was buried in the Old Enfield Cemetery in 1881, and his wife Annie in 1892. Their son Christopher was also buried there in 1914.

On 12 November, 1931, George, Ann and Christopher Brandis were moved to the North Road Cemetery.

These are the only known persons to have been exhumed and reinterred elsewhere.


The Old Enfield Cemetery was closed in 1945, and the headstones cleared shortly thereafter. What became of the majority of the headstones is unknown. There are very few photos of this cemetery in existence, and sadly the headstones were not photographed prior to their removal. The cemetery is now a park, almost lost between second hand car dealerships. A plaque has been erected on the site listing the names of some of the persons known to have been interred there.

PIONEERS' CEMETERY TO BE PUBLIC PARK



An old cemetery on the busy Main North road at Enfield which contains graves of some of the district's early pioneers is to be converted into a public park.

It is opposite St. Clement's Church of England

The 16 graves and headstones in the half-acre cemetery nestle among picturesque palm trees, shrubs, and flowers.

The cemetery was closed by Enfield City Council which plans to remove the headstones.

The oldest headstone is that of J. W. Cole who was buried in 1861. The newest is that of Charles Norman Alexander, who died in 1940.

Enfield town clerk, Mr. L. J. Lewis, said that a plaque commemorating those buried in the cemetery would be placed in the grounds.

THE GREAT HARVESTER CONTROVERSY

John Wrathall Bull was one of the very early pioneers of South Australia, arriving in the fledgling colony in 1838 with his wife and two sons aboard the 'Canton'.

A successful businessman, vigneron, pastoralist, author and gold prospector, Bull is mostly remembered for his invention of the first mechanical harvester.

In the early days of the colony, large crops of wheat were manually harvested and threshed. In 1843, the Adelaide Corn Exchange Committee offered an award for a suitable mechanical device to harvest standing crops and reduce labour costs.

Several working models were exhibited, with Bull submitting a model based on revolving beaters driven by a belt from the carriage wheels. Subsequently, John Ridley produced a reaper that was designed using Bull's principles, calling it the 'Ridley Reaper' and claiming

credit for the invention. There was much controversy at the time on who was responsible for the invention, and it was not until the issue was raised again in 1875 that John Bull was recognized and compensated. In 1880 Bull was finally awarded a Government grant of £250 for 'services in improving agricultural machinery'.

The controversy over who was responsible for the invention of the Ridley Stripper went on for a century, with an article published in The Chronicle in 1943 still debating the origins of the stripper. The eventual conclusion of the debate awards the major honor of 'inventing the fundamental principle of the stripper' to John Wrathall Bull, and the minor honor of 'making the first stripper' to John Ridley.



John and his wife Mary had ten children, and at the time of his death in 1886, only two of his children survived him. He was laid to rest with his wife in Plot 252, Path 20 South at the North Road Cemetery. His achievements have been memorialized with a plaque in his grave.



THE SPOONER FAMILY IN SOUTH AUSTRALIAN HORSE RACING

My grandfather Alfred Isaac Spooner was born in England in 1856 and became a well known Jockey in South Australia. He was a familiar figure on the South Australian race courses. He rode for many well known racehorse owners and retired in 1892. In 1896 his son John (Jack) Spooner became a jockey only riding in hurdle races and steeplechases. He had many wins most notable was the 1910 Grand National hurdle race at Victoria Park. In 1906 at the age of 21, he had a fall from 'Coalbox' – Alexander Jacques came to his aid. Unfortunately the race was still on and the young man was killed by the oncoming horses. Jack also rode in a few Great Eastern Steeplechasers at Oakbank but no wins. He served in France and returned to Australia in 1917.

In 1912 Jack's youngest brother William (my father) began his profession as a jockey. He rode in South Australia and Western

Australia and rode 3 consecutive winners in hurdle races in Perth in 1921. In the mid-1930's he worked for a Mr McCauley who at that time had a good sprinter called '*Unishack'* – he was taken to Melbourne in 1939 for the Oakleigh Plate and ran 3rd. The following year he returned to Melbourne again for the Oakleigh Plate and this time he came back to South Australia a winner!

Another family member in the racing industry was my father's Uncle Joe Tomlin (b.1870). In 1884 he won the Adelaide Cup on 'the Lawyer'. He rode in many States and also rode in 4 Melbourne Cups: 1888 'Lord Headington' midfield; 1889 'Night of the Garter' – 12th; 1890 'Singapore' – 8th (the year 'Carbine' won); 1892 'Oxide' – 7th. Joe also won 2 Goodwood Handicaps in Adelaide but when he rode in Broken Hill he had 4 wins in a day, including the Silver City Cup. He went on to win many more in Australia. A magnificent feat!

In 1932 a tragedy occurred in the family. My father's cousin Harry Higgs (a trainer at Glenelg) was married to a lady called Lillian. Lillian fell from the Big Dipper situated on the foreshore at Glenelg and died from her injuries.

Harry's nephew – Harry Walsh – became a jockey and later a trainer at Glenelg who rode in India in the late 1930's. His father, although not a jockey, became a boxer and fought in the featherweight division. His headstone was erected by the boxing fraternity at West Terrace Cemetery.


I married Phil Barrowcliff, a SA trotting family and from then on became involved in horse trotting. My husband's cousin Jack Barrowcliff was a well known breeder and owner/trainer and reinsman during the Wayville days. I personally owned one trotter *Crimson Boy* and leased 2 other trotting horses –*Crimson Lad* a half brother to *Crimson Boy and Judith Kaye* who was bred in Western Australia.

I have 5 winning photos in South Australia namely 2 wins for *Crimson Boy*, 2 wins for *Judith Kaye* and 1 win for *Crimson Lad*. My three children also were involved in ponies when they were younger, and even now many years later my daughter has an aged hack and my eldest son recently purchased a 2 year old hack. I guess horses are in their blood.

Whether working at home: at home and outside


Birthplace: Keighley, Yorkshire

This new upgrade on our original Database is now available on our computers. This version has advanced features, such as links to Headstone photos and other relevant supporting documents such as Newspaper articles, etc. We are at the very starting point from which we are planning over time to develop this application into the future. Moving forward it is likely we will also integrate Taylor and Forgie's Burial Orders into this as well.


It has 42,500 persons in the database, with some duplications where the one person may be in more than one register. For example, a person may be buried in Willaston Cemetery with the officiating pastor from St. Georges Anglican Church. In a case like this the person will be in the two respective registers.
